The classroom block has made tremendous progress. The roof was complicated, the building has been electrified and all door frames and window panes have been put in. There has been a pledge of paint from the bank which donated the cement and if that comes through it means the building will be complete soon. We are looking for furnishings for all the classrooms so that as soon as the building is complete the pupils can begin to use it. Some of the children cross the river and walk a long way so each time we saw the sky heavy with rain clouds we sent them home earlier than usual. Three of our avocado trees which were full of fruit, big big ones, were struck by lightening and it was surely a loss. We thank God it happened during the weekend and no one was hurt.



The examination centre has been used for O levels and can you imagine how we felt when we saw our students sitting in the

hall ready to write their first national examinations and being the first students at MRCH college to do so? We as a team feel satisfied with a sense of achievement against all odds and guess what, 2 of our students on the Community Based Care programme (CBC) were among the highest – J gained 4 As and 3Bs and R gained 4 Bs, 2Cs and a D. I had to share it with someone so I called Margaret. We were was so excited - introducing something new has its hiccups and fears you know. But Margaret will always remind you that "naJesu zvinoita Chete". (All things are possible with God)

2 Unfortunately, **J** is not able to come to school anymore due to financial challenges. R, our head boy who never sat for any exams before in his life, is also unable to pay his fees. When a child enrols into form one, the requirements are such that he should have taken his grade 7 exams. So because he did not do that we taught him outside normal hours for a whole year in 2010. In 2011 he then joined the rest of the students as a form one pupil. He is a dedicated student, mature and responsible, we are proud to have made a difference in his life. Both these boys will be our pioneer students not only at A level but also as the first of our students we have taught from 2010 to date. .

As a team we embrace the coming of the A level students and we are proud to be associated with this asset. It would be wonderful to see them through to University. Education is a project that can never die. Instead it will continue to grow. We started with commercial studies, Arts and humanities. We very much want sciences because they open many doors in life for our students but we do need a science lab to be

able to do that. However if we get adequate apparatus we can start by introducing biology which needs less practical work, unlike physics and chemistry.

5 Finances

Once again we have received the MRCH fully audited accounts. These show us that MRCH income is about 50% donations from within Zimbabwe and 50% from overseas. Both large and small donations come from a wide variety of individual donors and companies within Zimbabwe as well as UK and Australia. Obviously these can fluctuate and we are pleased to say that the regular monthly remittance of almost £5.000 received from the Friends is 49% of the overseas money and enables them to plan ahead and feel secure knowing it will arrive straight into their account.

This is a big change from the 80% - 90% of their income we used to send them and shows that they have greatly increased their support base.

"The Early Childhood

Development Centre is running at a deficit.

The biggest challenge is enrolment. There has been a mushrooming of crèches around the community and because of our location (at the end of the road in Epworth) most parents are sending their children to crèches near them, its a considerable

walking distance to reach us. The other point is half the children attending the crèche are resident MRCH children and they do not



pay. As of today, we only have 20 paying children. We are stepping up our advertising efforts and hopefully enrolment will improve soon. Margaret

According to the auditors in 2013 the MRCH accounts showed uncertainty about the sustainability of the Home continuing as a going concern unless they could increase their income and support base. The Homes staff and supporters were positive that they could turn things around and had posted a surplus by the end of the year. From mid 2014 up to date information presented to us, income and expenditure appear to be much more under control however there are still issues of high on going debt to statutary bodies which need to be addressed by the Home as a matter of urgency.

supports several thousand children in various communities providing medication, education, clothing, food, and in some cases even shelter. EM is from this programme and so far his education has been partially sponsored by a UK Friend. Now, because he has worked very hard and gained 2 A, 3 B, 3 C and 1 D passes at O level he has won a place at Waddilove High School to do A levels. He has dreams of going to university to study law so he will need further support after 2 years of A level studies. Each term at Waddilove costs £365. His first term cost £535.35 to cover his uniform and other equipment. Lloyd

The MRCH diet

Production of food at MRCH is expanding well since the generator makes sure full use can be made of the freezers. The irrigation system will be further extended this April by Australian supporters to guarantee the crops will grow in another part of the grounds. In 7 months last year over 2,500 chickens were sold locally and over 8,000kgs of tomatoes. Pork and vegetables were also sold to the local people and a supermarket, raising much needed revenue. Some is consumed by the children and staff but their diet also includes regular and unpredictable

monthly donations of beef, kapenta (fresh small fish) different types of vegetables, soya, milk and eggs. In the absence of such donations we have a policy in place which says that a third of the produce should be consumed by the children and 2 thirds ploughed back into the project.
