Report from National Director

Our September newsletter carried information from the National Director's report about the children's education.... Here is a further extract from the National Director's report about some of the projects your donations support...

Vocational skills training including registration, examination and placement fees

Transport for the children to various college sites, to foster parents or relatives and in tracing the children's parents or relatives

Children in tertiary training for uniforms, stationery and training materials.

The salary of a member of staff who traces the children's families.

Pocket money is given to the children to help them with some of their day to day needs.

MRCH National Project
MRCH has developed into a
national project. The construction
of the Bulawayo orphan care
project was completed in August

2007 and the Gweru project began in June 2007. We are moving into the Chinoyi District to establish another community based orphan care project in line with local needs and statutory provisions.

The National Project is mainly through the structures of the Methodist Church Zimbabwe. with the help of staff funded by NCH-UK. NCH provides valuable professional support and makes funds available for MRCH to hire professionals who assist in the strategic childcare development. With the support from the British Council. MRCH was able to hire a Childcare planning officer who is helping our children with community integration programmes. All the children in the care of MRCH will now have individual care plans.
