NEW GENERATOR UP AND RUNNING

After visiting Matthew Rusike last September, supporters Graham and Lynda Jones set about raising £17,000 to buy a generator for the site to overcome the problems of Zimbabwe's erratic electricity supply. By January this year they'd raised about £13.000 and the cost. thanks to a favourable \pounds exchange rate. had fallen to just over £16,000. At that point, the Friends of Matthew Rusike stepped in with an advance so the generator could be ordered. "Good news from MRCH!!!!" wrote Margaret Mawire on 11 March. "The generator is now at MRCH and the installation guys are working on it as I write. We can't wait to have it up and running. I can't begin to describe the excitement that is tangible here at the home."

The fund-raising continued, culminating in an evening with ex-Zimbabwean cricketer, Henry Olonga, at Graham and Lynda's home church in Tonbridge on 26 April. By then the fund had almost reached its target, so the bulk of the £800 raised on the evening will go towards fuel and maintenance for the generator.

As Margaret emailed last month: "The new generator has definitely made life easier. In the event of an electric cut, life goes on normally. Most importantly, it has helped our projects [the piggery, poultry and tomato-growing] in a tremendous way. Every cent that we get from the projects goes a long way in providing for the children in our care. To all the Friends of MRCH, thank you for your commitment to the children of Zimbabwe."
